Extra Credit: Pony Express

Background: The Pony Express was a mail service that used a horse and riders to deliver mail from East to West. The route covered 1,800 miles from Missouri to California. Riders could carry their mail in 10 days or less by changing horses about every 10 miles. In existence for less than two years from April 1860 to October 1861, the company never made money and the service stopped due to improved and much faster communication service of the transcontinental telegraph.

Pick up a Pony Express brochure at the Welcome Center to learn more about the route. Make sure to check out the statue commemorating the Pony Express just outside the Colorado Welcome Center.

Word Alert:

Mochilas—Spanish word for special leather bags used by the riders. **Transcontinental**—going across the continent, in this case from Missouri to California.

Telegraph—a system of sending messages along a wire.

Questions to Ask:

- 1. How do we send messages now? (letters in the mail, phone calls, text messages)
- 2. How did people in the 1860s send messages? (*letters and in some areas the telegraph*)
- 3. What was the job of a Pony Express rider like? (very hard due to the long rides, weather conditions)
